War and the Christian

I got a letter from a reader a few days ago taking me to task for what she perceived as my "agreement" with this war. "I don't understand," she said, "as Christians we should be taking the Gospel to other nations, not bombs."

The logic of that statement is unassailable. And yet, it leaves some important questions unanswered. Can a Christian take up arms against another person or even another nation? Surely not. And yet, if we take that reply to its logical conclusion, it would mean that no Christian could ever be a police officer. Can a Christian be responsible for the death of another human being? Surely not, but taken again to its logical conclusion, it would mean that no Christian could ever serve on a jury for a capital crime. The Christian duty to love our enemies, to forgive transgressions, to be merciful and kind, taken to extreme, would mean we could not even serve on a jury that would send a man to jail.

Most people who call themselves Christian intuitively know that these extreme positions don't work, but not many could tell you why. Thousands of Christians serve in both law enforcement and the military with a clear conscience. Are they wrong? Are they misguided? What is it that they don't understand? Or, if they are right, is it that those on the other side of the question don't understand?

One thing is certain. No one can argue that God is a pacifist. The scriptures on this are well known and plentiful. (I deal with many of them in a message we are offering with this month's newsletter.) But there is a common assumption that God's expectation of Christians is different from His expectations of godly men and women in the Old Testament.

There are a couple of important points to make about that. One, God hasn't changed from eternity. He is the same as He was 14 billion years ago when He said "let there be light" and initiated the Big Bang (see James 1:17, Hebrews 13:8, etc.). A God with perfect character isn't likely to change that character like a suit of clothes.

Does that God countenance

the use of force, even deadly force in some circumstances? If you have read your Bible, you know He does, but consider this example:

Ye shall not afflict any widow, or fatherless child. If thou afflict them in any wise, and they cry at all unto me, I will surely hear their cry; And my wrath shall wax hot, and *I will kill you with the sword*; and your wives shall be widows, and your children fatherless (Exodus 22:22-24).

Not only is God not a pacifist, He is particularly prone to anger with those who oppress the weak and helpless in a society. I know this may not sound like the God

you think you know. I can't help that. This is the God of the Bible, take Him or leave Him. But don't try to make Him over into what you want Him to be.

Did you notice that God didn't say He would kill them with lightning, hail, flood, or earthquake? He said He would kill them with the *sword*. In the Bible, the sword is the sign of the military and the law enforcement power of the state. And it is a sign of war.

The prophet Jeremiah spoke of it in those terms, and in terms that raise the hair on the back of your neck when you look at the locations in terms of today's fighting. You may not be aware of the origins of the name "Palestine." It is an English variant of the name of an ancient people, the Philistines. The Philistines were the first Palestinians. Substitute "Palestinian" for Philistine in the following passage, look up the geographical references and see where it takes you.

Because of the day that cometh to spoil all the {Palestinians}, and to cut off from Tyrus and Zidon every helper that remaineth: for the LORD will spoil the {Palestinians}, the remnant of the country of Caphtor. Baldness is come upon Gaza; Ashkelon is cut off with the remnant of their valley: how long wilt thou cut thyself? O thou sword of the LORD, how long will it be ere thou be quiet? put up thyself into thy scabbard, rest, and be still. How can it be quiet, seeing the LORD hath given it a charge against Ashkelon, and against the sea

shore? there hath he appointed it. (Jeremiah 47:4-7)

The sword which God had appointed against the Palestinians of old time was in the hand of Israel. Specifically for a while in the hands of David who said, "Blessed be the LORD my strength, which teacheth my hands to war, and my fingers to fight" (Psalm 144:1). When you read the context of the psalm, you will see that it was David's responsibility to protect his people, to oppose "the hurtful sword" so they could live in peace that led to much of his fighting.

Yes, things are different in the New Testament from the old, but consider this question. Why would the moral and ethical standards required of a righteous man change from one testament to the other? Actually, they don't, but the reasons for this are quite different from what you may suppose.

Space won't permit me to give a full exposition of this here, but let me send you a cassette tape of a presentation that will provide the answers. A New Hymnal for the **Churches of God**

Make a joyful noise unto the LORD, all ye lands.

Serve the LORD with gladness: come before his presence with singing. Know ye that the LORD he is God: it is he that hath made us, and not we ourselves: we are his people, and the sheep of his pasture.

Enter into his gates with thanksgiving, and into his courts with praise: be thankful unto him, and bless his name.

For the LORD is good; his mercy is everlasting; and his truth endureth to all generations.

This is the 100th Psalm, and may have been set to music almost as often as the 23rd Psalm. Like no other, it calls on us to come before God singing with gladness, praise, blessing and thanksgiving. How on earth could we ever do justice to the praise of God without song? Why on earth would we want to?

Down through the ages, men and women have been moved by the pages of the Bible and by way it has touched their lives. Thankfully, many of these have also had the gift of music and have been able to share with the ages the way the Bible has touched them. Not everything they have written has stood the test of time, nor should it have. But all churches need a book of hymns that reflect the truth of the Bible and the artistry of great composition. They need to touch the heart, to move the spirit, to encourage us in our time of deepest need, to exalt us in the times of our greatest joy.

CEM is now ready to publish a hymnal especially for the churches of God. We took a hymnal we had produced before, removed some hymns and added others. Thanks to the work of a devoted band of volunteers, coupled with no small blessing from God, we are now ready to go to press and we need your help.

CEM will have to take the financial risk of producing this new songbook and we need to have some idea of how many to print. For that reason, we want to ask those of you who want this hymnal to order early and, if possible, to pay early. We are not pricing this hymnal to make money, but we are going to try not to lose very much. The hymnal is top quality. Those of you who are familiar with the navy blue hardback will know what I mean. This book is being produced to the same specifications, including 100 year paper. Our original publication of the old hymnal was some eight years ago, and they have held up amazingly well.

We can't offer any bulk discounts for the book right now, because we are paring the initial price to the bone. For those who prepay, the new hymnal will be only \$9.95. For those who pre-order but don't pay until we are ready to deliver, the price will be \$10.95. The price for later delivery will be \$11.95. Expected delivery date will be July 1. I wish we could give it to you free, but we don't have the resources for that.

This new hymnal will be a fine addition to your home and worship services. We hope later to provide taped accompaniment for the songs so you can sing and learn them at home. Order now. Just fill in the order form on the back of the enclosed card and rush it back to us.
