intentions and then couldn't keep it, you would step up, admit that you are breaking it, apologize, and explain. In the absence of this, you have every right to assume the politician is a liar. And yet, people vote for liars all the time and rarely give it a second thought. Why do they do that?

It is hard to say. In part, we can blame party politics. We identify with a political party, and the other party is the enemy. So, we tend to believe our own politicians and shout "Liar!" at the other party, which, indeed, they may be. But if we aren't prepared to recognize the liars in our own party, we may be as corrupt as the politicians we despise. What shocks me a little (but only a little) is that this phenomenon is present in the news media to the same extent as it is present in us.

But that is only part of the story. Why do we get played for suckers by professional liars? Because they tell us what we want to hear. What I am describing is a colossal lack of wisdom, what we sometimes call common sense, but what is increasingly "uncommon sense."

It came to mind recently when I was reading the introduction to the Book of Proverbs in the Bible. Solomon starts as a good writer should. He states his purpose, the reason for the book. In simple lines, he lays out ten things that form the purpose of the book. They include attaining wisdom and personal discipline, understanding words of insight, acquiring a disciplined and prudent life, and in

general developing good sense and character. Then he summarizes: "The fear of the LORD is the beginning of knowledge, but fools despise wisdom and discipline" (Proverbs 1:7 NIV). I am beginning to suspect that when some members of the political class look at us, they have concluded we are all a pack of fools, a mindless mob. And perhaps that is not without reason. That first chapter goes on to speak of a certain class of crooks. Their spiel to the unwary is: "Come along with us; let's lie in wait for someone's blood, let's waylay some harmless soul; let's swallow them alive, like the grave, and whole, like those who go down to the pit; we will get all sorts of valuable things and fill our houses with plunder; throw in your lot with us, and we will share a common purse" (Proverbs 1:11-14 NIV).

It reads like a band of outlaws, but the principle is all too common and is far reaching in application. "Let's take advantage of some harmless soul, or class of fools." The communists claimed to have found a new idea. From each according to his ability to each according to his needs. But if you notice, some people's needs far exceed those of others. The concept was expressed in *Animal Farm*, by George Orwell. The ruling class on that farm were the pigs. Their mantra was, "All pigs are equal." But when some pigs got more than others, it was noted that while all pigs are equal, some pigs are "more equal than others."

"Throw in your lot with us and we will share a common purse." It sounds like Robin Hood, doesn't

it? It is also the motto of some in the political class. But we soon learn that some pigs are more equal than others, and they get fat in the process. Politicians who promise to take wealth from people who have earned it and give it to people who have not, are exactly like this gang of bandits. They invite you to throw in your lot with them. And, once you do, you start believing the lie.

It has been this way ever since we allowed men more power than it was right for them to have. Solomon went on with a classic example of personification: turning wisdom into a person, in this case, a woman. What should we take from Solomon? To me, it means I am utterly without excuse for not acting on the wisdom that is right there for me, all the time. Wisdom is not hidden away in the dark. She is in the high street, and on the courthouse steps.

If we are going to be stupid, it is because we love being stupid and silly. It isn't because wisdom is hard to find. In fact, she rises up and slaps us in the face all too often. Why do we then still make stupid mistakes? We just don't want to know. The fear of the Lord, said Solomon, is a choice we can make. It isn't forced upon us. We can reject it if that is the road we want to walk. "For the turning away of the simple shall slay them," said Solomon, "and the prosperity of fools shall destroy them" (Proverbs 1:32).

We seem to be living examples of this right now. We have witnessed the prosperity of fools, and we have seen the fools destroyed. And we probably aren't

finished yet. I have to confess that I am puzzled by what is going on right now, but I am not paralyzed with fear. The reason is what Solomon says at this point in his dissertation: "But whoso hearkeneth unto me shall dwell safely, and shall be quiet from fear of evil" (v. 33).

How does that work? It isn't because we think the evil cannot touch us, because we know all too well it can. Partly, I think it is because we don't rely on money to take care of us. We have a higher power who can create something worthwhile out of a disaster.

So, what is it in us that allows the charlatan, the lying salesman, the thieving politician to take advantage of us? They tell us what we want to hear. We won't admit it, but sometimes we just want to believe the lie.
